Enhancement continues at CCC Park

► OKC Troop 4 Boy Scouts clear 12 foot wide equestrian trail

Troop 4 Boy Scouts, Westminster Presbyterian Church in Oklahoma City were in Perry Saturday for a service project in Camp Tan Da Ko at Perry's CCC Lake.

They arrived Friday evening at the Camp Tan Da Ko facilities and departed Sunday, May 2-4. While there they cleared and restored walking trails.

Ron Frantz, who is the architect for Oklahoma Main Street, first visited CCC park while in Perry, helping with design assistance on the Perry square. While they had a few minutes to spare, Vicki Hagerman took him to CCC Lake to see the projects underway to restore the property.

When he came back a couple of weeks ago, Hagerman, David Payne and Jim Franklin took him and Dr. George Selby, scoutmaster, on another tour to determine what the troop members could do as a service project.

"The first time I visited CCC Lake, I could hear it calling our troop," said Frantz. "It is a wonderful place. Our group loved the facilities."

To prepare for the project, Payne and Franklin used late 1930s aerial photographs to determine the original locations of the equestrian trails and pedestrian trails laid out by the CCC in Perry Lake Park. They marked these with red flags. Hagerman brought everyone together for the project.

Frantz gave Hagerman credit for being the key person to bring all of elements together for the Scouts to come to Perry. "Vicki's enthusiasm is contagious," said Frantz. "I truly believe the troop is very serious about returning next May for another service campout. We loved the area."

Frantz also expressed appreciation to Franklin and Payne for their help getting this project started. "It was the final upper for the group to see the response of Franklin an Payne after we finished," said Frantz.

Frantz said Marilee Macias at the Kumback Lunch had three dozen cinnamon rolls baked for the group on Saturday, something they don't usually do on a Saturday. "The Scouts loved getting a taste of Perry," said Frantz. "Not a crumb was wasted."

With 12 adults and 18 youth, the troop cleared a 12-foot-wide equestrian trail. The length of the trail was 2/10 of a mile long, or approximately 1,056 feet.

It took six hours times 30 people (or 180 Scout-hours) to clear almost 70 years of growth (cedars, greenbrier, poison ivy,

brush) and reclaim 12,672 square feet of trail.

As one adult leader, Mark Vaughan said, "In many areas of the trail, we were on our hands, clearing at the rate of six inches at a time."

Each year, the group visits different places throughout the state for a service project including such places as Quartz Mountain and Fort Gibson, etc. "We have a very diverse group," said Frantz. "They are from a wide variety of denominations and from all walks of life."
